LITERACY LEARNING

This can be a very controversial topic in ECE with opposing philosophies from interested parties.

Many early childhood philosophies are based on play and learning that occurs organically through experiences in the environment. We often hear from external agencies such as ERO (Education Review Office) that they don't like to see 'structured' group times, or teacher led activities in the early childhood environment. We also have many primary school teachers that see school readiness to include not only children being able to self manage themselves but can sit still and join in a group time, ask and answer questions, use pencils, glue and scissors capably, and at least recognise their name as essential for a successful start to school. We also look at our own local curriculum which includes the Pohutukawa Kindergarten philosophy and the aspirations of our community when planning our programme.

Pre-literacy skills involve all developmental dimensions not just language! Children need to develop confidence in their own abilities and resilience to keep trying. They need to show an interest in wanting to read and write and develop the joy from the imaginative world and information learning it can bring. They need to have hand eye co-ordination and cross lateral skills to support brain development. They need to be strong enough to hold themselves in a good posture and strong-arm movements.

Our programme includes auditory and visual skills, movement, print and language awareness.






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INTERNAL EVALUATION

How can individual planning improve the quality of learning outcomes? How can this planning be reflected in our documentation compared to previous styles?

We continue to work on our individual planning cycles and have mostly identified a learner focus for each child.

We are documenting these both in the portfolios and on the planning walls so please keep an eye out. The teachers will now document progress of each child as we see them working towards these learning goals. We encourage you to make the time to read your child's kete ako, look at the planning walls and talk to the kaiako.

A <u>learner focus</u> is a short statement that children can relate to that states their current learning goal and supports their developing learner identity.

"Internal evaluation is a systematic process used to evaluate what is and is not working, and for whom, and then to develop our practices and make improvements as a result of evaluation" p15 Ngā Aronga Whai Hua

PUĀWAI ROOM

This term we are focusing on one of our values of Respect - looking at kaitiakitanga. As we move into winter and more inside play, we would appreciate your support in encouraging your child to help to look after the environment and resources, e.g. dirty shoes off when coming inside, using resources in an appropriate manner, when finished – putting things away for others to come and use, we also have some treasure hunters that like to take resources home! Additionally, encouraging them to take responsibility for their things: clothes, lunch boxes, and water bottles.

AFTERNOON PROGRAMME

Our tamariki thoroughly enjoyed our 'all about me' learning last term, looking closely at who we are, where we come from, and lastly outer space with our Stardome trip. Thank you for all those that came to help, it was such a great experience for our tamariki and such a great day!

This term we will be learning about **literacy focusing on phonics** using Yolanda Soryl letter sound association and letter formation using Casey Caterpillar language. Please feel free to ask us about this and if you would like any more information.

We will have a small teacher led group time before heading off to a related craft/science activity. This learning time is a fun way to help give our tamariki a base foundation and introduction to first sounds before they go off to school.

We have our new planning wall that is now up and running! It is very exciting as

we look more closely at each individual learner and their 'learner identity.' We would love to catch up with each of you over this next term, and will start looking at booking in some times from the 4th week. Please make sure your <u>child aspiration form</u> is filled in and returned.

FAMILY BOOST

The Family Boost payment is now up and running. It is made directly to families with young children to help with the rising costs of early childhood education (ECE). The Family Boost payment will be equal to 25% of ECE fees already paid by households, maximum of \$975 every 3 months, have a household income of less than \$180 000 a year, effective 1st July.

Families can claim this every 3 moths by applying through IRD. We have had several families successfully apply. If you want to do this then please let me know if you need an updated version of our invoice (License numbers must now be included).

You will also need an IRD# for the child you are claiming for so need to apply for this if they don't yet have one. You will then login through your own IR login to process

This can be claimed for past periods too.

ENROLMENT CHANGES

With our new Student Management System, each time there is an enrolment change you will need to sign the piece of paper acknowledging the change. This will also be true for extra days booked in advance.
